SOUL CITY, N.C. - "The groundbreaking for Soul City is probably a once in a lifetime thing for North Carolina, and perhaps in this part of the country. Its a historic occasion. It represents an idea and a dream that a lot of people have worked hard to make a reality, and its obvious that it's becoming a reality. It represents more than just the concept of a new city, starting from scratch, although that in itself is exciting. But the fact that its being put together by a basically black corporation, and yet a city that's open to all people, is a concept that shows just how far this country has come in human relations, and in the spirit of goodwill. Through the use of federal funds and private dollars, the cooperation of governmental and private sectors have made this thing happen. And, frankly, the spirit that has been around the Soul City project from the very beginning has been very much like the pioneer spirits of Christopher Columbus, Daniel Boone, the people who put us on the moon, and all the rest.

Those were the words of an exclusive interview with North Carolina's Gov. James Holshouser, Jr. during a reception at his mansion for those who co-chaired the groundbreaking ceremony. They captured the mood and this moment in history which Floyd McKissick has wrought. Other good words came from a variety of government and private citizens like Lawrence Toal, veepee Chase Manhattan Bank; T.M. Alexander Jr, regional adm HUD: Arthur Reid, OEO; Sam Jackson; Stanley Scott, special asst to the pres; Bob Brown, who held that position when Soul City was just an idea; Hon. Clarence Lightner, newly elected black Mayor of Raleigh; Mayors Howard N. Lee, Chapel Hill, N.C., and Johnny Ford of Tuskegee, Ala, more than 500 others representing 36 states within the nation listened and applauded this partial awakening of a dream. Soul City is the first free-standing new town to be developed in a rural area by a minority-owned enterprise. It is a new hope for Warren County, which is about 2/3 black and. one of the poorest in this state.

History will record this time as the moment when Floyd McKissick and the young said yes to let the future in. Unfortunately, few of us oldsters will be about to glory in the final deposit of the necessary huddle of human habitation which gives life and breath to a city. The groundbreaking ceremony was the culmination of plans that had been five years in the making. The groundbreaking ceremony is scheduled to start the first industrial facility, Soultech I, that will employ over 300 persons. Housing, shopping areas, and additional industries have been projected for the first three year phase. Private capital is now being sought under a \$14 million federal loan guarantee. Perhaps there was some "in-grave" turning since in days gone by the 3,000 acre plot that is eventually geared to house 44,000 people, over the next three decades, was once a slave plantation.
