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JOB OUTLOOK GOOD FOR H.S. GRADS

LAS VEGAS -- Nevada high school graduates wanting to become salesmen, hospital workers, food service employes or small machine repairmen should have little trouble finding jobs through the remainder of this decade, Nevada's employment chief said here Friday.

Larry McCracken, executive director of the Nevada Employment Security Department, said those jobs are all part of the service-producing industry, and through 1980 and probably beyond, that general area of employment is where the majority of jobs are.

McCracken was one of three job expert panelists during the last day's activities of the 1973 Nevada Personnel and Guidance Association convention. With McCracken on the panel were Freda Klein, employment counselor in the Las Vegas office of the Employment Security Department, and Jack Jeffrey, a Henderson city council-man and member of the electrician's union.

McCracken, citing Department of Labor Statistics, said service-producing jobs by 1980 will outnumber goods-producing jobs two to one. Service-producing jobs range from waitress and insurance salesman to social worker and gas station attendant. Goods-producing jobs involve the areas of tool and die maker, construction

laborer, miner and farmer.

In Nevada, 73 per cent of the total 1973 work force--or about 217,500 workers--is employed

in jobs which provide a service.

"Nevada is heavily in the business of services, and employment will continue to develop mainly in this area," McCracken said.

"Between 1962 and 1972, finance, insurance and real estate in Nevada leaped 120 per cent, services by 91 per cent and trade by 83 per cent and were the fastest growing industries," said McCracken. In the total employment market, the services-producing industry alone accounted for almost half of the job openings during that decade," he said.

The employment chief said ever-increasing technology, in computer science and related fields, has and will continue to alter the job
