## Registrar of Voters

Registrar of Voters Stan Colton, in addressing the Breakfast Lions Club of Las Vegas, revealed that only fifty-eight (58%) per cent of the people eligible to vote in Clark County were registered in November, 1972, and of that figure only eighty (80%) per cent actually cast ballots. That would mean that only forty-eight (48%) per cent of those people eligible to vote in Clark County exercised a voice in who they wished their elected representatives to be.

Colton urged all clubs and organizations

Colton urged all clubs and organizations within Clark County, to take an active roll in urging their friends and neighbors to become registered voters. Colton further urged them to register early so that overtime expenses created by late registrations close to Election Day could be kept to a minimum. Last year over \$10,000 in overtime was spent by the Clark County Election Department due to a heavy late voter registration.

Persons who have been a resident of Clark County for thirty (30) days can register at 400 Las Vegas Boulevard South from 8:00 o'clock A.M. to 5:00 o'clock P.M. every day of the week. Persons who are unable to register at the Election Department because of physical handicaps may contact the Election Department at 382-4982 to make arrangements for registration either at their homes or the Convalescent Hospitals in Clark County.

## **Community College**

With the registration of 510 additional students for the alternate fall semester, total fall enrollment at Clark County Community College is up nearly 70 per cent over last year, according to recent statistics reported by Dr. R. Stephen Nicholson.

Nicholson reported that 3190 students were enrolled at the community college as of Nov. 12, compared with 1899 students on the same date last year, an increase of 68 per cent.

Of the total this fall, 2680 students enrolled in the regular fall semester beginning last August and 510 students registered for the alternate fall semester which started early in November. By comparison, on the same date last year

By comparison, on the same date last year 1656 students were enrolled in the regular fall semester and 243 had registered for the alternate fall semester.

"We are very pleased about the number of new students utilizing our alternate semester," Nicholson said.
