Many individuals have called on the NAACP

office for help in insuring their constitutional rights to a fair day in court. Others have called on the NAACP office for unjust arrests and harrassment by members of the Task Force because they were mistaken to be pimps because of the clothes they wear or the cars they drive.

The NAACP is also concerned about the negative effects this Task Force imposes on the black individual and the black community.

The Task Force appears to promote seg-gregation.Blacks are afraid to visit the Strip Hotels and discotheques and whites are afraid to visit West Las Vegas. This is a definite advantage to some of those discotheque owners who have found no other legitimate means to "keep blacks out." The business in West Las Vegas needs a variety of people of all races to be successful.

The NAACP is in full agreement that visitors to Las Vegas should not have to be subjected to embarrassment and harrassment by pros-titutes, but the priority of prostitution activities is questionable to Citizens all over West Las Vegas who are gravely concerned about the problems of Narcotics and the decay of our community caused by DOPE, robberies and burglaries and the constant cause of rape all over the country.

Realizing the shortage of manpower on the Metro Police Force, citizens would rather have that manpower used to protect their property.


