program to help Clark County's youths find jobs this summer.

Smith said city officials have agreed to pay for all utiltites at the Youth Employment Service (YES) headquarters, except telephone costs. The YES headquarters will be open later this spring, in time for the early June Kickoff date.

Smith said more than 450 Clark County summer jobseekers already have signed up for jobs through the YES program. "I urge area employers who will have job openings this summer to contact the Las Vegas Employment Security Department office, 'said Smith. Coordinator Bob Fay is handling the local summer

When the headquarters opens for the summer, it will be staffed with young people who will take telephone orders from employers with jobs to fill and who will register other young people looking for work.

Three employees recently completed the Miner Training Program conducted by Rey-nolds Electrical & Engineering Co., Inc., bringing the total of miner trainee graduates to nine since the probram began July 18, 1966.

Classified as miner journeymen after nearly five years of arduous training and study are Curtis Amie, Henry Banks and Elbert Eubanks. Amie began his training July 7, 1969, and accumulated 3,510 mining hours and 2,231 related training hours. Beginning his training Sept. 11, 1969, Banks chalked up 3,309 mining hours and 1,891 related training hours. Also starting his training in 1969 was Eubanks, who attained 3,237 mining hours and 2,254 related training hours.

Included in the requirements these men fulfilled were: 550 hours of drilling with a pneumatic drill; 50 hours of explosived handling; 250 hours of grot, shotcrete, etc.; 1,200 hours of ground support; 300 hours of bar down scaling; and 150 hours of safety and classroom train-

ing, which totals 2,500 hours.
For the duration of their training program the trainees worked with qualified miners and received credit only for the actual time spent on a particular piece of equipment or on a specific assignment.

Over the nearly five years of apprenticeship by each individual, the Training Section per-formed the challenging task of maintaining the trainee's records on hours of training, performance and knowledge evaluation.
