YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM EXTENDED

Better than 900 teenagers enrolled in the Clark County School District's Comprehensive Youth Program will keep their jobs through August 1, according to assistant superintendent Dr. Claude G. Perkins.

By then, however, the final \$92,000 from a federal grant of \$562,701.00 will be exhausted and all students jobs under the program will be terminated.

Originally a total of 945 students currently enrolled in the program was told that jobs would end July 19. This sparked picketing at the school district Education Center on Flamingo Road and at others offices throughout the city.

By August 1, the Comprehensive Youth Program will have provided jobs for approximately 1200 youngsters. The average teenager will have earned \$436.00 tax-free by working five 30 hour weeks, one 20 hour week, and two 24-hour weeks.

Perkins admitted the school district overhired young people in the program this summer. He said, however, he would rather "follow this year's decision and provide as many jobs as possible for as long as possible rather than appraoch the program cautiously and return unused funds to the federal government."

Pastor Vows To Fight on

Bethel Baptist Church, members voted Monday night, at the quarterly membership meeting to uphold the April 22 meeting which voted to dismiss Rev. Wilson.

Altho singing and shouting followed the vote of ratifing Wilson's dismissal-other events have cast shadows over the conflict.

A complaint filed by Rev. Wilson seeks \$5,000 for legal fees and \$10,000 allegedly due Rev. Wilson plus a permanent injuction to allow deacons elected at a July meeting to assume their position.

Members in opposition to Rev. Wilson pastorship have refused to give legal status to that meeting. Because the last annual meeting was held in Noverber of 1973- hence a meeting held before November 1974 would not be official.

On sunday July 28th, the possibility of more conflict appears to be coming up if Rev. Wilson attempts to conduct servic-

Rev. Wilson has steadfastly maintained that he is still pastor and as such he is the head of the church. The deacon board chaired by George Osley contend that thay are the main authority in the church and that the board elected in July has no powers.
