

# TWO MEN SHOT TO DEATH

Robert Carter, 29, of 1529 McGuire and Lannie Browhaw, 22, of 1061 Blankenship, were gunned down in the parking area behind the Sugar Hill Bar on Miller.

Joseph Johnson, 41 was arrested and booked into Metro jail on two charges of first degree murder.

Details of the shooting are scarce - although many people witnessed the shooting, many of them are reluctant to give statements to police.

Rumors of what happened are being circulated. According to one version, Johnson's son was accosted and beaten up for allegedly refusing to loan two dollars to four guys. As a result of the beating, Johnson is believed to have come looking for the men who beat his son. Evidently, Johnson had reason to believe, Carter and Browshaw were two of the four reported to have taken part in the beating.

Carter died on the spot and Browshaw was D. O.A. at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital. Arresting officers, who were on patrol in the area, just happened to be turning the corner, saw Johnson standing with a smoking gun in his hand.

and drug traffic continues to rise, yet INTERPOL is continually funded by GOVERNMENTS with no power to ensure human rights or safeguards for its citizens."

Deceived local German police departments by not stating the true reason for the report on the Church.

Illegally disclosed confidential police information in violation of German law.

Involved Interpol in violation of article 3 of its charter which strictly prohibits Interpol from any activity involving politics, religion, military or races.

Church officials have predicted that over a billion dollars worth of law suits will be filed before this matter is completely resolved.

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# TENTH ANNIVERSARY E.E.O.C.

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has been unusually busy in recent weeks commemorating the tenth anniversary of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This is as it should be. Title VII, which prohibits employment discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, or national origin, is without a doubt one of the most important titles ever enacted by the United States Congress.

Observance symposiums have already been held in Atlanta and New York City. Others are scheduled for Seattle, September 30-October 1; Kansas City, October 7-8; Austin, October 9-19; Cleveland, October 14-16; and Philadelphia, October 21-22.

Title VII became law on July 2, 1964, at a time when our nation was greatly concerned with extending to all its citizens the basic freedoms that are their birthright.

At the height of protest demonstrations and national civil disorders, there was great concern for equal opportunity in housing, in voting, in education and in public accommodations. The greatest concern, however, was for equal opportunity in employment.

When the late President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the historic legislation, he called it a "milestone in American progress toward full justice for all her citizens." It was indeed a milestone, but it was not won without a long, hard struggle on the part of many civil rights groups and liberal lawmakers.

Title VII, which also established the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, marked the turning point in Federal efforts to end job discrimination. The original provisions left much to be desired, but it was a start. Because the EEOC was required to settle charges of discrimination by informal methods of conciliation and persuasion, enforcement was, in fact, left to the "good will" of those charged with violations.

As time passed, Congress recognized the shortcomings of the original provisions of Title VII. In 1966 and each year thereafter, liberal lawmakers attempted, in vain, to strengthen the job bias law.

Finally, in 1972, the Congress gave EEOC additional enforcement powers. The amendments gave the Commission authority to file suits in Federal district courts against private employers and unions when all other means of achieving compliance failed. The Commission's jurisdictional coverage was also expanded.

The vital 1972 amendments came as the Commission was beginning to strangle on a backlog of charges it was attempting to conciliate, and gave the job bias agency a new lease on life.

Today charges are still being made that EEOC is choking on a 100,000 backlog. But energetic Commission Chairman John H. Powell, Jr., announced a few weeks ago that his agency resolved 37, 537 charges in FY 1974, an increase of 17, 350 over the previous year. He added that some 4,519 successful conciliations during the year ending June 30, 1973, resulted in cash benefits exceeding \$56.2 million to more than 49,000 workers.

At the present, the average time for processing a charge is about 26 months. Chairman Powell has vowed to reduce this time by at least 50 per cent during his stay at the EEOC. Right on.

The Commission has also announced the establishment of an EEOC Training Academy to provide thorough, professional and uniform training for EEOC compliance personnel. During the first year, some 600 candidates will be trained in compliance, interviewing, communications investigation and conciliation techniques.

These forward-looking plans hold great promise for blacks and other minorities who for so long have been the victims of pervasive and systematic employment discrimination. We salute the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission on the occasion of its tenth anniversary and say "full speed ahead" in the next decade -- a period which will surely test the destiny of America and her commitment to true equality in employment and all other facets of American life.

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
