Margaret Sloan, who, with a group of friends founded the National Black Feminist Organiza-

tion because "everyone was talking for Black women but us," is the guest on Woman, Tuesday, October 15 at 9:30 p.m. on Channel 10.

"Sexism is the underlying ism from which all other isms flow," the outspoken former civil rights worker tells moderator Sandra Elkin. "It's an oppression that transcends class and race."

Ms. Sloan and several other black women started the NBFO last summer because "there was a lot of misrepresentation in the press about black women and their relationship to white wo-men, none of which was written by black women."

While traveling around the country with Gloria Steinem, lecturing on feminism, Ms. Sloan says she rioticed that women who didn't live in New York or California "had read the media and felt that women in those areas were the only ones who had it all together. But we would see really radical projects and very imaginative things going on in their towns. It was mind-blowing for us."

Toy Warnings

Woodrow Wilson Makes M. L. King, Jr. Awards

Princeton, New Jersey -- The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation today announced the award of thirty-six Martin Luther King, Jr. Fellowship to black veterans who are pursuing graduate or professional study in preparation for careers of service. These fellowships are awarded each year in a national competition to men and women of outstanding promise, and provide support for study at a school of the fellow's choice. Sixteen King Fellows have been awarded for their year of advanced study, and 20 are be-

ing renewed for a second year.

Since its beginning in 1968, the King Fellowship Program has awarded 251 fellowships. A recent survey shows that, almist without exception, those fellows who have finished their schooling and are now employed, followed the directions they set out in their original state-

ment of goals.

Over 400 inquiries about the competition were received, and the 16 first year fellows were chosen from 200 completed applications. After receiving their graduate degrees, some of the fellows will return to work in their hone towns in the South, while others plan to use their pro-fessional skills in the urban ghettos. All of the fellows are dedicated to bringing about responsible change in their communities. According to Program Director Douglas B. Sumner, "the fellows are chosen for the depth and realism of their commitment to public service. They want to improve education, raise the standard of health care, and insure that justice is equable as well as legal.'

The Martin Luther King, Jr. Fellowships have been supported by contributions to the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation from 20 corporations and foundations, and a number of individuals. Among recent donors are the Grant Foundation, Booth Ferris Foundation, Bell Laboratories, the Field Foundation of Illinois, and

General Service Foundation.
