Charles Sifford, the first black pro to play the circuit, had many barriers to overcome. It was a big problem for him to gain respect from the other pros. Sifford managed to overcome those barriers and pave the way for other Blacks to join the tour. One gets the impression when talking with Sifford or with some of his admirers, that the other Blacks do not respect him for his role as the pioneer Black to break the color barrier.

Formerly Director of Nursing Psychiatry at Harvard University Rachel Robinson, following her husband's death in October, 1972, resigned to become chief executive officer of the construction firm which he founded. Mr. Duckett co-authored Robinson's memoirs Never Had It Made" published by Putnams a day after funeral rites for the Brooklyn Dodger star and Hall of Fame member.

In the autobiography which won the Coretta Scott King Award in 1973, Robinson wrote
"the day of the Black
manager...is inevitable. It will get here when an owner finally realizes that the argument that white play ers will not accept advice from a Black is phony."
