SULLIVAN TALK SCORES

The real estate industry was called recently the last strong-hold of discrimination in America by the Rev. Leon Sullivan, minister of the Zion Baptist Church, in a Las Vegas speech. Sullivan told the National Association of Realtors convention, "We're sitting on a seething volcano, and in time this seething volcano will erupt." He added he was referring to the slums and de facto segregation.

Sullivan's remarks prompted several conventioners to walk out of the Las Vegas Convention Center gathering.

Sullivan, the founder of the Opportunities Industrialization Center, said, "The greatest danger facing America today is our expanding ghetto. If it is not checked and a national program initiated for its elimination within the next 10 years, we will see nationwide disorder spreading from city to city."

"It will be on a scale never seen before until the Army will be needed in nearly every large city to maintain law and order across the nation."

He added the Federal Housing and Urban Renewal programs have miserably failed the needs of the poor. "Miles and miles of inner cities have been cleared out by bulldozers, houses torn down by the hundreds of thousands and nothing has ever been put back in their place."
