

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Two aspects pf Cadet Captain Dorian T. And-erson's life at the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, are unique. First, he is the Regimental Commander of one of the four Cadet Reginemts. Second, he is the first black man ever to hold this important leadership position.

Anderson, a 21-year-old native of Brazil, Ind-iana, is a First Classman (senior) and as Regimental Commander is responsible for the leadership of 1,000 Cadets. He speaks of the Academy as a great opportunity for himself and for other young blacks who are interested in at-tending West Point. He cautions, however, "it isn't going to be easy, you will be treated as a Cadet first.

A halfback on the Army Lightweight Football team (158-lbs. or less), Dorian lead the team in scoring with 62 points, and rushing with 435 yards, for the six-game season. The team has won 20 straight games and gained five consecu-tive Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference Titles. Dorian has also lettered in wrestling and is active in the Cadet Rugby Club and Behaviorial Science Club.



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
