

EDUCATION HIGH SCHOOL TO COLLEGE

SCHOLARSHIPS

Two special scholarships are now open to qualifying applicants for Clark County Community College instruction, it was announced today by Pat Springs, Financial Aid Coordinator.

The Phi Delta Kappa Sorority, Gamma Sigma Chapter, provides a minority student scholarship of \$200 in honor of Mrs. Mabel Hoggard.

The American Society of Safety Engineers provides a \$250 scholarship for a student who intends to complete his two year Associate In Arts degree in the field of occupational safety. The qualifying student will also become a student member of the American Society of Safety Engineers, Southern Nevada Chapter, and participant at its meetings.

Polisci 104

"Neat is the way one advance registrant for Political Science 104, titled, "Political Process," described his reason for taking an innovative course at Clark County Community College's Spring Term, commencing January 20, 1975.

While registration officially begins January 15, incumbent students have the option of advance registration and counseling.

Instructor Dr. Larry Tomilson, who earned his Ed. D. degree in the teaching of Social Sciences from Ball State University and has taught at Idaho State University prior to coming to Las Vegas, describes the course as "another dimension."

By "another dimension" he means that he will use science fiction writing as a major input for the thought oriented course. Writers such as Isacc Asimov, Arthur C. Clarke, Paul Anderson, Art Burchwald, and B.

F. Skinner will be studied - all for their mentally generative contributions to possible solutions for political problems.

"Science Fiction is not what it seems to the average layman; it deals with ethical norms and deals with human questions that are not being asked with the consequences that very few minds are reaching for ethical answers," Dr. Tomilson says.

Some educators, concerned with the integration of educational content, are at work in this field by studying concepts and translating them into particular situations which affect people at any given time in their own lives and in history.

The trouble has been that the researchers have not been able to identify the design or structure that underly our social problems. Dr. Tomilson equates this with the laser beam which focuses macro-cosmic energy into a

microcosm, a smaller area.

It is the sharpening of the individual's understanding of technology and its impact upon political systems that can help the individual formulate and determine his political future.

While there is risk that the individual will freak out of the system and not take part, not vote, and escape the front line problems involving himself and others, the probabilities, according to Tomlinson, are greater that he will see the wheat over the chaff.

Political Science 104 at Clark County Community College will be both a course and an experiment for the Spring Term, 1975.

C.C.A.F.

The Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) is now fully accredited by the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges, (AACJC). The

action marks CCAF as the first military member of AACJC. Although CCAF awards a career educational certificate in lieu of a degree several nationally recognized educators have said that the program is equal to many 2-year programs in the nation's leading colleges. The purpose of the Community College of the Air Force is to grant credit in the form of semester hours for the Technical training completed by Air Force members. 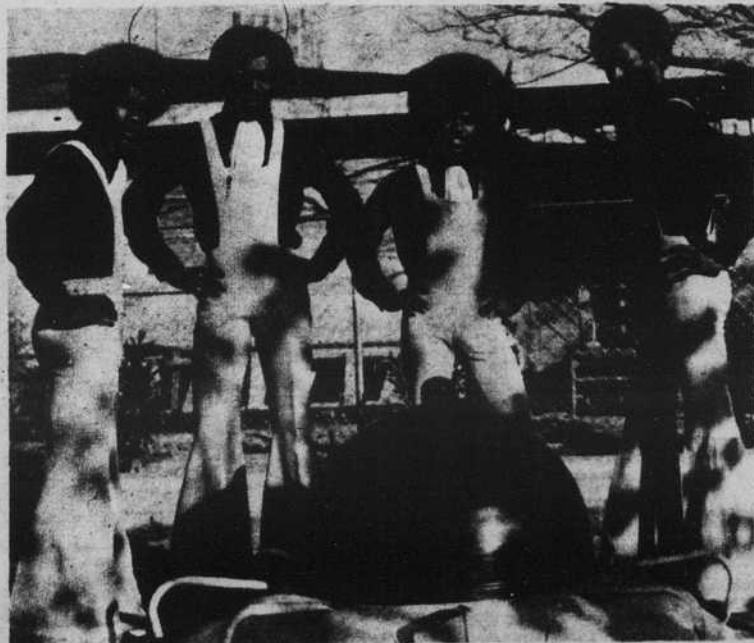
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
