A presidential veto today brought immediate and sharp criticism

from the head of the National Association of Mental Health. The Ford veto of the Health Revenue Sharing and Health Services Act of 1974 spells a temporary end to federal funding of the **Community** Mental Health Center program.

Mrs. Gerridee Wheeler, NAMH President, said: "As a citizens" group whose membership numbers well over a million people whose total concern is better care and treatment of the mentally ill, President Ford's veto has brought dismay, disappointment and shock. ORIGINAL DEFECTIVE

The NAMH President, also a Republican Na-tional Committeewoman from North Dakota, ad-ded, "Economic rationale for the veto is no excuse. With economic conditions growing more grim, we will see an even greater need for mental health services.'

The National Association of Mental Health strongly supports continuation of funding for the CMHC program, and has set a goal of seeing that 1500 centersare established by 1980. Currently there are 500

centers in operation.

Mr. Wheeler conclu-ded, "The Community Mental Health Center program is a non-partisan effort supported by all partisans of improved care for the menand the drug abuser. We are puzzled by the President's lack of support but are certain that very early in its next session, the Congress will overwhelmingly continue the program.

Nevada would join the National League of Cities, The National Governors' Conference, and the states of Arizona, Washington, Utah, Oklahoma, and New Hampshire, in seeking to have the 1974 amendment to the Fair Labor Standards Act declared unconstitutional. The suit is brought under the 5ht, 10th, and 11th, Amendments to the Constitution of the United States, List reported, because the amendment which becomes effective January 1, 1975, would require the state as well as the county and city governments in the state of Nevada to be controlled by the Fair Labor Standards Act.

List stated that the act would prohibit the

Atty. Gen. Robert List state and all other muwork more than 8 hours /day or 40 hours/week unless it paid them time and one-half for all hours in excess of that state provides compensatory time for employees who work in excess of the maximum hours, and that would be prohibited by the Act. Such - control, List pointed out, would put an impossible burden on the budgets of state and local governments, causing tremendous tax increases, as well as an imposition by the federal government into the local management of state operations.

> The suit alleges that the cost, quality, or both of police and fire protection services, highwayrepair and snow removal services, trash collection, sewage tr-eatment, park maintenance, and many other state and municipal services would be severely affected, List said.
