GARSSIDE GETS IT TOGETHER

A unique program takes place daily in Garside's multi-purpose room which involves approximately 700 to 800 students are afforded the opportunity to participate in several activities. Among them are: ping-pong, shuffle board, pool, bumper pool, dancing, or "rapping" among themselves.

The area is composed of a space equivalent to four regular classrooms and is separated by a divider. One side has ping-pong tables and a space for dancing. The other half contains two professional-type shuffleboards, two regulation pool tables and three bumper pool tables.

The multi-purpose

room is open each morning from 7:25 a.m. until 7:55 a.m. and during each of the three lunch periods.

This program was set up by the counseling department and is supervised by one of the counselors and two student aides.

Once students have finished eating in the lunch area, they are allowed to visit the multi-purpose room to enjoy themselves. No food or beverage is allowed in the facility.

As a bit of added enjoyment, students are afforded the opportunity to listen to the most current popular music of the day. K.V.E.G. Radio has kindly offered to supply Garside with top ranked records through

the year. When not being used before and after school or during lunch time, the multi-purpose room may be used by any teacher for the purpose of rewarding his students for classroom achievement.

Benefits derived from utilization of the multi-purpose room are many. Both in the morning and during the lunch periods, congestion is relieved in the lunch area, hallways and other critical spots on campus especially the bathrooms. One need only to observe the black and white students dancing playing pool or ping-pong with each other to realize that interracial harmony is being achieved.
