"They promised to look into every complaint individually and give me a full report," Williams said. "Still, I got the impression that they were only there to defend themselves and not really to see what was happening to homeowners here." "They had an answer for everything. To them,

nothing was wrong except that us homeowners weren't smart enough to understand how to read

our meters and figure our power bills." "We can understand inflation. We can under-stand fuel shortages. We can understand environ-mental protection. But these problems did not double or triple just recently. Power bills have.'

'I'll tell you this. These mengranted Nevada Power the increases. Despite their good intentions on behalf of consumers, I see chicken feathers on the fox's mouth. I think they are being skillfully manipulated and 'snowed' by the hired professionals of Nevada Power, whose only job is to handle

the PSC." "The two men I met with, Commissioners Heber Hardy and Noel Clark, seemed to think it was reasonable that over 100,000 meters a month are read by only 18 meter readers and that some of these meters are supposedly read at a distance of up to 75 feet with the naked eye. And they seem to think the only problem we have is that it gets cold in the winter in History." "I get the feeling that they are no longer sen-

sitive to the human element of their decisions Onlythe business and number side of it. There are people in our community going without heat this winter while Nevada Power is making over \$10 million a year in profits and threatening us if they don't make more. The PSC doesn't see the inequity of the situation.

Williams said there are specific actions he intends to take at the earliest appropiate opportunity.

Asking the County Commission to require Nevada Power to undergo a full impartial management study to determine if they are an efficiently run company before granting a permanent franchise extention.

Asking the County Commission to stipulate in the franchise agreement that meter readers would be instructed to leave a date sticker or other proof that they actually have read each customers meter each billing period.

Asking the County Commission to upgrade the county building codes for new homes and additions to present homes, to assure that power meters are put in a more accessible location on homes. Also to require better insulation standards on homes to improve heating and cooling efficiency. -- Requesting Southern Nevada's Legislative

delegation to introduce legislation restructuring the Public Service Commission to a partially elective, partially professional commission so that consumers will be more accurately represented and members will be more sensitive and more responsive.

 Requesting legislation granting a property tax reduction for homeowners who improve the degree of insulation in their homes.
