


ART IN AFRICA: Treasures from the Congo, by Joseph Cornet, Phaidon Press

Every once in a long while a book is published which is published beyond any description and im-portant beyond all others before it. The ART of AFRICA is such a book, the kind that you would want to own, to put on the coffee table, to pour through by the hour, if only you had the \$60 for the price tag that comes wiht it and the time it de-mands. mands.

The title of the book is slightly misleading, for the art it pictures and describes is centered around the Congo River in the country now called Zaire. But no matter, the art within its pages is as the heart of Africa; to browse through the magnificent full-color photographs is to touch the heritage of all Africa.

One photograph of these incredible creations of "primitive" Africans is worth, at the very least, an hour of one's time. A t that rate the book would be worth 180 hours of serious pleasure. But the equal number of pages of text will give the seri-ous reader and equal amount of pleasure.

African art, its masks and statuettes and fe-tishes, is deeply involved in the religion and cul-ture of its people, while at the same time it express beauty and creativity. The two aspects of the art of the thirty-three tribes of the Congo are carefully examined and interpreted by the author. The result is not only a big and beautiful book, but a meaningful and significant contribution to the un-derstanding of Africa derstanding of Africa.




KUBA - Divining instrument




KUBA - Pipe




LWALA - Female Mask








LUBA' - Stool
