DYMALLY AIRS VIEWS ON OPEN COLLEGE

California's Lt. Governor Mervyn Dymally characterized his proposed "open college" as the most viable and valid alternative to present traditional higher education, in an address to the 49th Annual Conference of the National Home Study Council held in Hamilton, Bermuda.

Dymally, the first naturalized Black American to hold the second-highest office in the nation's most populus state, proposed the establishment of an open college to the California's Senate late in 1974 and it is expected to be voted upon during the present session of the California legislature. The open college program would be made available to students of both resident and correspondence schools.

Dymally explained that "The open college would give credit for what students have learned no matter how they learned it. There would be no rigid time schedules. Classes would be held when and where they were most appropiate, with a class in a ccounting, for example, held in a bank after hours.

The California state executive noted that many people are unemployed to day not becaude jobs do not exist "but rather because these persons lack the training and skills necessary to perform the jobs available."

The open college proposal also embodies education offered by correspondence schools. "Homestudy schools offer many of the attractive features that the open college would entail," he said. "Access to these schools is as close as the nearest mailbox, and thus the school comes to the student. The pace of learning can be set by the student, and since all individuals do not learn all subjects with equal ease, not all students are forced to learn at the same rate. Correspondence schools offer the flexibility necessary for those individuals whose study time must be fitted around job hours or other activities."

"College, as we know it today, is not suited to everyone, Dymally observed. "There are segments of society who often cannot take advantage of the state's existing college and university system. They include working men and women, busy executives, homemakers and mothers; the aged

and the handicapped; residents stuck in ghettos and barrios; dropouts who wish to add to their know-ledge of professional skills and students who do not fit into the routine of regular classes, course pre-requisites or entrance requirements."

Dymally urged correspondence schools to maintain high educational standards as part of their role in an open college. He warned that those who didn't would quickly be eliminated from the field

Dymally served California for four years in the Assembly and eight years in the Senate before his election as lieutenant governor last fall. He has been a long-time advocate of liberalized education programs, including home study.
