POISON CONTROL with a lock is often all

District Health Department nurses provide followup on specific poison cases treated at the Poison Information Center at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital.

Cases involving accidental ingestion of poisons by children are referred to public health nursing for followup through home visits.

In cases where children accidently ingest tient. poisonous substances, the nurse and parents discuss various safety precautions that are necessary to keep harmful substances such as detergents, waxes, pesticides and lighter fluids out of the reach of children.

Poisonings often occur when individuals accidentally take more medication than has been prescribed.

The nurse assists in these cases suggesting that only one day's med-ication be set out each morning.
