Controversial documentary

"Harlem: Voices, Faces" -- a documentary about present-day life in America's best-known black ghetto, will be presented on Channel 10's Special of the Week Monday, May 19, at 8 p.m. The program will repeat Saturday, May 24, at 9 p.m.

Produced in 1973 for Swedish Television, the 90-minute film is not an attempt at a definitive statement about Harlem, but, a view from the outside presented in the hope there is something to be learned from what others see. Comment the producers, "This documentary is a program about the ordinary, unknown black citizens of Harlem, USA, who are allowed to speak for themselves.

"Anything you can learn in school you can learn in the street," one young cynic tells the camera, "because that book stays in school, but you have to learn to live in the street. People will do anything conceivable to the human mind to make money," he continues, "because the American ethic is to get rich quick."

In defense of this attitude a Harlem social worker says, "In order to pull yourself up by the bootstraps, you have to have the bootstrap to call


