# Blue Magic zooms to top in two years

In less than two years, Blue Magic has been catapulted from the street corners of Philadelphia to the top of the charts throughout America. With two gold records, (the single "Sideshow" and their debut album, "Blue Magic") and their second Atlantic Records LP, "The Magic of the Blues," breaking sales records daily, hardly an instant goes by without one of their tunes being danced to at a disco or played over R&B, Pop, and "Underground" radio stations. In addition, Blue Magic received gold records for their work on the Rolling Stones album, "It's Only Rock and Roll."

The five Philadelphians have the maturity needed to maintain their sudden status. Rather than resting on their laurels, the recipients of Record World's Top R&B Male Vocal Group award for last year, are conducting a vigorous schedule of personal appearences and recordings, including a duo with Margie Joseph for a forthcoming Atlantic Record release.

Reports streaming out of Philadelphia's Sigma Sound Studios concerning recording sessions for the group's third Atlantic album have generated excitement in the music business.

Tentatively titled "13 Blue Magic Lane" and produced by W.M.T.O. Productions and Norman Harris with the powerhouse backing of the MF-SB Orchestra, the tunes recorded thus far are a continuation of the quintet's journey into spiritualism, and the occult.

An observer, granted entrance into the usually closed Sigma sessions, reported:

"I hear the mixes on the first five magical tunes. recorded. The world had better be prepared!

"'Loneliest House' is a strong remake of the recent Little Anthony and the Imperials ballad, with MFSB providing some taste touches. In more of a mid-tempo vein, Blue Magis'c Ted Mills contributed 'Chasing Rainbows,' a fine showcase for his compelling vocal and writing style.

"As a musical exorcism, the hypnotic 'Born On Halloween' is chillingly effective. With its witchcraft theme and eerie sound effects, it's no wonder their style is called 'sexy soul'."

"One of the disco songs they've cut, 'The Magic of the Blue,' should not be confused with the album of the same name.

According to our correspondent, "13 Blue Magic Lane" will be no stranger to the burgeoning disco scene.

"In addition, Norman Harris has completely reworked 'We're On The Right Track Now,' which he wrote and produced for Ultra High Frequency 18 months ago. The extended Lp version will be a strong disco entry."

After hearing the two numbers described above, Billboard's disco editor, Tom Moulton, wrote they were "the strongest the group has done since 'Welcome to the Club.' The latest Lp has cuts geared for club play."

In addition, Ted Mills, Blue Magic is composed of Vernon Sawyer, who designs the group's costumes, Keith Beaton, Wendell Sawyer, and Richard Pratt.
