Well, the 1975 Nevada State Legislative Session is finally over after lasting a record duration and passing some much-needed legislation.

The patient and persistent lobbying efforts of members of the Clark County Welfare Rights Organization were rewarded by a 20 percent increase in Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) grants. Our lawmakers increased the governor's recommendation of a \$51 average grant and agreed upon a monthly grant of \$54 for ADC recipients.

This change will take effect July 1 and means a significant and substantial raise in the amount of income families dependent on welfare will have to live on. It will mean that more families will now be able to make ends meet for a change. More mothers will now be able to provide for their children's needs without worrying day and night about where the next meal is coming from, how they can pay the electric bill, or whether they will be able to pay the rent.

The raise in ADC grants was less that what we were asking for, but it is still a great victory. Nevada's legislators have proved that they are responsive to their constituents and that they do care about the needs of the people.

To all of you who wrote to our state senators and assemblymen asking them to increase the grants to ADC recipients, we extend our heart-felt thanks on behalf of all welfare mothers and children in Nevada. We commend you for taking the time and making the effort to express your opinion to those whose decisions affect all of our lives.
