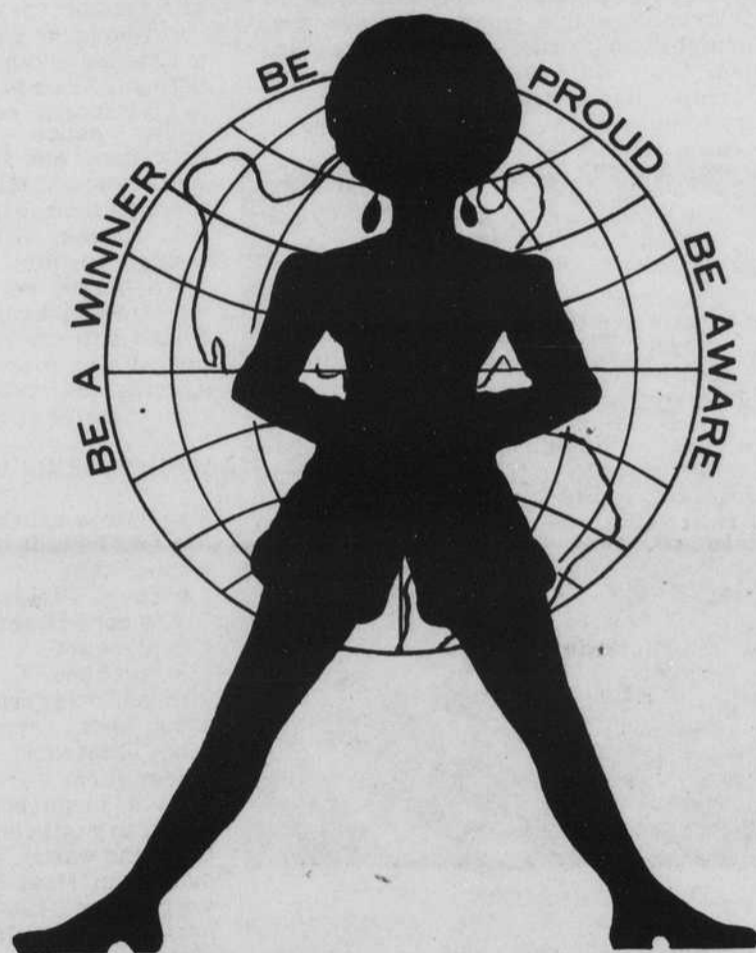

Highway fatalities hit new low

Clark County had a 13-year low in traffic deaths for the month of May according to the Nevada Office of Highway Safety.

There were four, Clark County fatalities in May, the lowest number since 1962. There were 11 highway fatalities statewide during the month.

Nevada Highway Safety Coordinator John Borda said he was pleased with the drop, adding, "credit should be given to increased citizen support of highway safety programs in the county as well as the selective traffic enforcement program of the Nevada Highway Patrol."

Special NHP enforcement teams funded through the Office of Highway Safety, have been operating in the county since April 4.

Clark County's highway death total for 1975 remains under last year. There have been 32 fatalities in the county during the first five months of the year compared to 34 for that period last year.

Vegas student aims to become governor

Ron Robinson, a former senior class president at Clark High School, is currently completing his junior year at Southern Colorado State College in Pueblo, with hopes of returning something to the community that is his home.

"I would like to return to my community and become politically involved. My supreme goal is to someday become the Governor of the State of Nevada," says Robinson.

A pre-law major and history minor at Southern Colorado State, Robinson has been actively involved in politics and government ever since he arrived at the Pueblo campus.

He was the first Black justice of the school's Supreme Court and is presently the chief justice of that court.

The official Parliamentarian of the Pueblo branch of the NAACP, Robinson is studying to become a certified Parliamentarian and plans to attend the Stanford University Law School.

"My state and community gave so much to me when I was living in Nevada that I hope I can show them my appreciation by working with them after my education is completed," says Robinson.
