Classic ballet, body control and artist expression are the sub-ballet classes being offered this summer at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

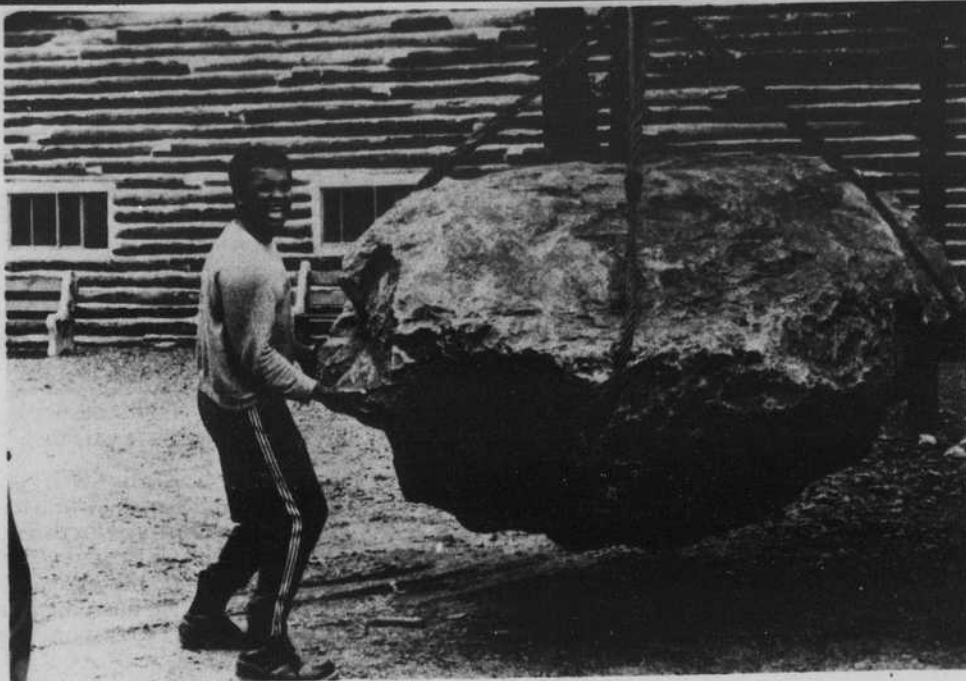
The classes will be taught by Vassili Sulich, who is also director of the Nevada Dance Theatre. Classes will meet in the new modern studio in the Paul McDermott Physical Education Center.

Each course consists of 14 classes devoted to ballet techniques. Each course runs from June 9 through July 24.

Courses are: beginning youth, Mondays and Wednesdays, 4 to 5 p.m.; beginning adult, Monday and Wednesdays, 3 to 4 p.m.; intermediate adult, Tuesdays and Thursdays, 4 to 5 p.m.; and advanced adult, Tuesdays and Thursdays, 3 to 4 p.m.

Kiss tells Ali where fists fail

When Muhammad Ali was Cassius Clay and living in Louisville, he suffered his first knockout -- at the lips of Areatha Swint.

Cassius was 17 then; Areatha was about 15. Walking her home from high school, Ali relates in the June issue of *Crawdaddy* magazine, "I just turned around... so that I was standing facing her with my back to the stairs that led up. And we kissed.

"But after she gave me that kiss, don't you know I fainted, and fell back down the stairs. All the way down. Whew! I'm

telling you, I fell out. I was gone, even though I landed on my head. I didn't feel nothing...

"After that, I just kept training and fighting, and didn't look at no more girls for a while."

Ali's recollection of his first kiss is one of a score that the magazine collected under the title "Growin' Up."

Areatha Swint Eubanks, incidentally, wrote to confirm Ali's version: My relationship with Cassius was one that certainly could be rated 'G' she wrote, "I remember him as a witty, shy boy, always

a perfect gentleman and a bit of a practical joker. When he fell back on the stairs, I at first thought he was kidding, but when he landed so hard I realized it wasn't a joke."

Not all the contributors sent writing. John Lennon, for example, sent a snapshot of a man at a urinal. I.F. Stone, whose name appears on the cover, limited his contribution to: "What's this, some way to get a lot of big names on your cover?"

Comedian Rodney Dangerfield, at age 53, said that "to me, life is just a bowl of pits."

UNLV tennis team nets good record

Like most of the other sports at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas this year, the UNLV tennis team enjoyed its finest year in history.

Under second-year Head coach Fred Albrecht, the Rebels finished the 1975 year with a fine 18-5 record and a fourth place tie in the West Coast Athletic Conference Tennis Tournament.

Four Rebels advanced to the semi-finals of the WCAC Tournament and one other, Craig Creel, took a first place in the consolation bracket.

Bruce Stubbs, who played at the number one singles spot, Jim Scott, the number three singles man, Paul Lorrington, number four singles, and Doug Johnston, the number five singles player, all made it to the semi-finals.

Every member of the team had a winning record for the 1975 season.

The top four singles positions on the Rebel roster were all filled by freshmen this year. Stubbs finished the year at 13-8, Dan Knight, at the number two spot, was 10-9, Scott was 15-7, and Lorrington had the best record on the team at 18-4.

The remainder of the team was composed of sophomores. Johnston, who suffered a broken foot during the tournament and was forced to default his semi-final match, was 15-5 for the year. Another sophomore, Creel, was 12-4 while Eric Dondich, still another sophomore, was 5-3.

The three Rebel doubles teams were comprised of Scott-Johnson, Knight-Stubbs, and Lorrington-Creel. The Lorrington-Creel combination made it to the semi-finals of the WCAC Tournament as well.
