

Parents will be glad to learn that Operation Life's Summer Lunch and Swimming Pool Program will continue this summer. Last year we served free lunches to a large number of children from low-income families, and they also took advantage of our swimming facilities.


The program this year will be pretty much the same as last summer. All children under the age of 21 who are from low-income families may come into Operation Life at 400 W. Jackson to receive their free lunches Monday through Friday, beginning June 9th. Then they are encouraged to swim or to go across the street to our community library, which is well-stocked with interesting reading material and which will also be offering various activities of educational and recreational benefit.

The only request we make of the children is that they remain in the building until they have finished eating. The U.S. Department of Agriculture, which provieds the funds for this food program, requires that the lunches be eaten where they are served, and should not be taken home.

Operation Life intends to do all we can to ensure that children receive the good nutrition they need. The Summer Lunch Program is an important part of our efforts to serve the needs of the community.

We invite all of you parents with low family incomes, to send your children over to 400 W. Jackson for lunch this summer, beginning June 9th. The staff of Operation Life wishes everyone


