

# BLACK NAMED DISTRICT COURT JUDGE

Addeliar Guy, 51, a deputy Clark County District Attorney for the past nine years, will be sworn in July 15 as the first Black to be appointed to a District Court judgeship in Nevada.

Guy was appointed Friday to the post by Gov-ernor Mike O'Callaghan. The position was created this year by the Nevada Legislature. Guy will preside in Las Vegas. The post pays \$30,000

Guy has served as the chief deputy district attorney since 1973. He began his law practice in Nevada when he joined the district attorney's

office in 1966 as a deputy prosecutor.

A native of Chicago, the new judge had his schooling in that city and was admitted to practice before the Illinois bar in November, 1957.

He graduated from St. Benedict High School before entering Wilson Junior College and then Loyola University School of Law where hereceived his L.L.B. degree in 1957.

He was admitted to practice before the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit in February, 1964, and a month later was admitted to practice before the United States Supreme Court. In December 1966, he was admitted to

practice before the Nevada bar.
Guy served in both World War II and the Korean War. He has had service in both the U.S. Coast Guard and the Army. Currently he holds the rank of Lieutenant Colonel with -the Nevada Army National Guard Judge Advocate Corps.

He has been active politically and in both business and civic organizations, and has served on numerous committees and organizations.

From 1957 to 1960 he was in criminal and civil practice and in Chicago served as assistant corporation counsel and defended the City of Chicago and police officers against charges of violation of

civil rights and police brutality.

In Clark County he was with the district attorney's office in various capacities, being the chief deputy district attorney from 1973 to the

He was recommended for the judgeship by both prosecuting and defense attorneys in southern Nevada, the governor said.
