Abernathy blasts Ford's economic plans

The SCLC Task Force on the Economy met and analyzed President Gerald Ford's economic and energy program, and were sorely disappointed at the thrust of his direction.

2. We are equally distressed with his plans to cut the budget where it is designed to support human needs of American people, such as health; education and welfare, while advocating additional millions of dollars in support of Vietnam.

3. In addition, we totally oppose the continued escalation of the defense budget which increasingly saps the re-sources and moral strength of our Nation, while the cities and country-sides are deteriorating from lack of support from our nation's government.

Harvard profs rap Coleman statements on desegregation

NEW YORK--Court-ordered desegregation of inner city schools cannot be blamed for White flight to the suburbs, said Dr. Robert L. Green, dean of the College of Urban Development, Michigan State University, and Dr. Thomas Pettigrew, professor of social relations, Harvard Uni-

Green and Pettigrew, in a prepared statement, criticized the research and recent statements of University of Chicago, professor James S. Coleman, primary author of the 1966 "Coleman Report" on equal educational opportunity.

The two professors took issue with Coleman, indicating that he slanted his data and used opinions rather than fact in stating that White Flight is caused by desegregating schools. They added that many variables other than race may be correlated with White Flight.
"Among these variables are the increase in

crime, the movement of industry from the cities, pollution and urban blight," they said.

Coleman's conclusion that court-ordered intergration has been a failure was based on an analysis of 20 cities over a five-year period, However, Coleman's analysis of the next 50 largest cities indicates that increased intergration of schools 'had absolutely no effect on White flight,' Green and Pettigrew reported.

"However, Professor Coleman does not emphasize this data," they said. According to Coleman, court-ordered desegregation produces resegragation. Green and Pettigrew pointed out that the greatest amount of northern White flight occured between 1950 and 1970, long before efforts were made to desegregate nothern schools.

The two professors also critcized Coleman for stating, without presenting substantiating data, that there is a correlation between school desegregation and private school attendance.

Coleman's statements blaming White flight on fear of disorder "also seem to be based on opinion rather than data," Green and Pettigrew

They added that such fear cannot be denied, but the responsibility for disruptive behavior is related to a complex set of factors.

'Initial disorder connected with desegregation generally involves White parents rather than Black children, and this disorder seems to be short-lived," they commented.

Recently, Coleman has stated that the courts

have gone beyond their Constitutional duty by ordering desegregation.

Green and Pettigrew, however, said that the task of desegregating schools fell to the courts because school boards were not carrying out their responsibilities.

'Most northern scholars," they added, "rearded the courts as being the proper instrument for effecting social change in the South.

'Had the courts waited for desegregation to 'flow out of the will of the community,' as Professor Coleman puts it, the public facilities, voter rolls, and schools of the South would still be segregated.'
