The Clark County Welfare Rights Organization has offered to take over administration of the food stamp program, in response to State Welfare
Administrator George Miller's Statement Friday, that he would like to get rid of the program.
As President of CCWRO, I immediately responded. Many working families need and use the

food stamp program during this time of economic crisis, and would be severely hurt if it were eliminated. The food stamp program is not a welfare program, and it serves many more nonwelfare families than welfare families. In ansewr to Miller's statement that the program is wide open to fraud, I can only say that George Miller has a long history of rash scare statements re-garding "cheaters" that are always exaggerated beyond belief. Then he later claims he was misquoted.

If Mr. Miller is so anxious to get rid of administering the program, CCWRO would be happy to take over that function. We already operate other food programs -- we successfully operate a \$1.3 million WIC program on only a seven percent administration budget. George Miller's administrative budget is a much higher percentage.

Miller stated Friday, in an interview that he would like to see the food stamp program eliminated in Nevada, and have the money put toward direct cash grants. CCWRO would also like to see cash grants to ADC families raised, but ending the food stamp program is not the answer. The food stamp program has brought millions of federal dollars to Nevada in the past year, and these federal dollars could not go to increase ADC grants.

Nevadans should not be alarmed by George Miller's comments--the food stamp program is good for the people and the economy of Nevada.
