## **IMMUNIZATION**

For Week of August 4

The District Health Department has scheduled free well child examinations and free immunization clinics for Clark County families.

Well child exams are only available by ap-pointment for children up to four years old at St. Timothy's Ep i scopal Church at 42 Pacific Avenue in Henderson from 8 a.m. to noon Wednesday and at the Teen Center in Boulder City from 10 a.m. to 3:30 Thursday.

The public health nurse will check the children for normal growth and development and make referrals if any abnormalities are observed.

Call the Health Department to make an appointment.

Free immunizations to protect against polio, measels and diphtheria are available to children from two months to 21 years old at the Teen Center in Boulder City from 10 a.m. to 3:30 Thursday, and at the Boys Club at 2530 E. Carey in North Las Vegas from 9 a.m. to noon.

**CETA** Program **Helps Unemployed** 

Unemployed and underemployed residents of Clark County can use the Comprehensive Em-ployment and Training Act (CETA) program "as a gateway to meaningful jobs and adequate wages," CETA Affirmative Action Officer Rudy Navarro said recently.

Navarro said Clark County's CETA program is for all residents who meet its guidelines, regardless of race, creed, color, sex, or national origin. He said CETA's objective is economic self-suf-, ficiency for the disadvantaged--particularly Vietnam and other veterans, handicapped persons, youth and senior citizens, recipients of public assistance and persons who speak little or no English.

Problems with the English language won't keep Spanish-speaking persons out of CETA, Navarro added. He said bi-lingual CETA staffers are provided to answer queries about the pro-

gram and work with CETA participants. Las Vegas and North Las Vegas residents interested in the program should check with the CETA sub-contractor for manpower service at 900 W. Owens Ave. CETA information also is available in Henderson in room 30 of the Henderson Civic Center, 200 Water St.

Navarro said CETA participants are helped in many ways before they ever report for the first day on the job.

He said each enrollee's vocational needs are studied and job counseling is provided. Barriers to employment also are analyzed. If medical, dental, legal, child care or transportation problems are handicapping the enrollee in the job market, CETA provides assistance in these areas, too.

Finally, job developers, working with local employers, find jobs for the now work-ready en-rollees. And follow-ups on each placement help insure maximum satisfaction for both employers and employees, Navarro said.
