






FOOD CENTER-This assembly line will allow the Clark County School District to serve a hot lunch to any child that wants one. When school opens on September 2, students will have nutritionally balanced hot lunches available to them at 45 cents in elementary schools and between 45 cents and 70 cents in junior and senior highs.



200 BUSES -Nearly 200 school buses will transport all students living more than two miles from their assigned classroom to and from school. Buses are housed at 25th and Stewart and on Arville off West Tropicana. The different yards reduce "deadhead" mileage (travel without children on board) and thus improve the efficiency of the transportation operation.





Headquarters for the central administration of the Clark County School District are at 2832 East Flamingo Road, near Eastern Avenue. Opened in August 1964, the Education Center houses the offices of Kenny C. Guinn, Superintendent of Schools, and four specialized divisions: Personnel, Business. Administration and School Facilities.

Directly south of the Education Center and facing Eucalyptus Drive are the District's Warehouses and Maintenance buildings completed in 1966. The Transportation Department is located at 4499 West Harmon Street in Las Vegas. Educational Television operates out of Southern Nevada Vocational-Technical Center, Mountain Vista and Russell Roads.

Enrollment To Top 79,000

Enrollment in Clark County public schools is expected to increase by about 1,600 students to a total just over 79,000 youngsters in kindergarten through 12th grade, according to the Clark County School District.

Most of the students are in the metropolitan area of Las Vegas. North Las Vegas and surrounding unincorporated area, which accounts for 71,050 students. 4,722 students are expected in Henderson's five schools, 1,702 in Boulder City, 768 in Moapa Valley, 370 in Virgin Valley, 336 in Indian Springs, and 128 in rural schools at Blue Diamond, Goodsprings, Mt. Charleston and Searchlight.

Better than 41,600 students are expected in elementary schools, while 19,600 will enroll in grades seven, eight and nine. 17,190 high school students are expected, while 1,768 youngsters at all grade levels will enroll in special education programs.
