Stevie Wonder & Motown sign highest pact in record history



HOLLYWOOD-The biggest contract in the history of the record industry was concluded recently between Stevie

Wonder and Motown Record Corporation.

The agreement calls for guarantees to Stevie over a seven-year period of more than \$13,000,000. This unprecendented sum equal to the deals of Elton John and Neil Diamond combined.

Considered an authentic genius by other recording artists and producers as well as the general public, Stevie is philosophical about the historic deal.

"Of course I'm happy about it, but there is something perhaps even more important involved," he said.

"Im staying at Motown because it is the only viable surviving black-owned company in the record industry. Motown represents hope and opportunity for new as well

as established black performers and producers. If it were not for Motown, many of us just wouldn't have had the shot we've had at sucess and fulfillment.

"In the record industry we've all seen many cases where the big companies eat up the little ones and I don't want this to happen to Motown. I feel young black children should have something to look up to."

"It is vital that people in our business--particularly the black creative community including artists, writers, and producers--make sure that Motown stays emotionally stable, spiritually strong, and economically healthy."

Ewart Abner, president of the Motown Records division of Motown Industries, spearheaded the neogations for landmark

"It is difficult to translate Stevie's special kind of creative genius as an artist, producer and writer to a dollar sign," Abner said.

"When a performer gets to the plateau that Stevie owns, he stands alone and it is obvious he could command just about anything he wanted with any record company in the world.

"That is why we at Motown are especially gratified with Stevie's philosophy that he can best help his brothers and sisters by keeping Motown strong so there will be a market-place for their creative talents."
