# New Food Stamps For Old After August 31

Food stamp recipients are able to exchange old food stamps for new ones. The old stamps expire Aug. 31, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced.

Recipients can exchange the old stamps at local food stamp offices designated by state agencies. The exchange will be dollar for dollar, new food stamps for old.

USDA introduced the new food stamp series on March 1, 1975. The new \$1, \$5 and \$10 denominations replace the 50 cent, \$2 and old \$5 stamps.

### **BLM Land Sale Scheduled**


Two parcels of national resource lands, one just south of Carson City and the other in northern Nye County, are being offered for sale Sept. 24 by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) at the Federal Building in Reno.

Nevada State Director Ed Rowland said about 3.7 acres are eing offered two miles south of the State Capitol in Carson ity near the junction of Highways 50 and 395. Located in the agle Valley, the property is zoned residential and power, elephone, and gas service are nearby. He said a 20 acre parcel in the Grant Range east of Railroad Valley in northen Nye County also is being offered for sale. cannot be sold for less than the appraised value.

Rowland explained the parcels will be sold by public auction and added the laws authorizing the sales specify conditions interested persons should understand.


