

Bob Bailey, well-known Las Vegas business-man and community leader, has filed for the office of State Senate from District 4. Bailey is

"There is a tremendous amount of energy within our community, and I want to direct that energy toward positive results in the Nevada Legislature," said Bailey. "We must have a dialogue with those people from whom we are seeking support, and that takes concentrated effort and work, but most of all a spirit of cooperation rather than divisiveness."

Bailey's commitment to the community is based on more than 20 years' residence and leadership positions in many positive efforts to improve the economic and social conditions of

leadership positions in many positive efforts to improve the economic and social conditions of black as well as white citizens.

Bailey was Nevada's first Chairman of the Nevada Equal Rights Commission, and in that position worked for passage of Nevada's equal rights legislation. He held the position for six years and also became the Regional Director of the First Western Regional Conference of State Civil Rights Commissioners.

In his position with the state, Bailey helped promote significant improvements on job op-portunities for black citizens along the Las Vegas Strip. promote

Bailey was the first coordinator of the On the Job Training program at Circus Circus, which provided training for blacks, Mexican-Americans and Indians in many casino jobs. He also established the first free training program for Yeno dealers in the state, and organized the Keno dealers in the state, and organized the first free training program for dealers at the Stardust Hotel.

Bailey said the central theme of his campaign would be the building of bridges to the entire community. He said he specifically wanted to
