

Abandoned Houses Offer Profit

Of major importance to our community is the elimination of abandoned boarded-up houses. The value of your property is deeply cut if you have any abandoned houses in your block. Especially if your entire area has them. If they are not good enough to rehab they should be torn down and hauled away.

Last October F.H.A. offered 3 and 4 bedroom homes not over 6 or 7 years old for sale by bid of \$2,000 to \$4,500 as minimums. I checked these properties and found them to be excellent buys. The profit potential was excellent. A group of 20 blacks could have pooled \$2,000 each making a \$40,000 basic capital. With this they would ing a \$40,000 basic capital. With this they would have purchased four houses with \$18,000 and could have rehabbed them with \$18,000. These properties selling \$17,000 each would produce \$68,000. Taking selling costs of 15% (\$10,000) plus original cost for purchase and rehab (\$36,000) or a total of \$46,000, a profit of \$22,000 would be realized. Adding this to the original \$40,000 capital would create \$62,000. Six houses could then be bought and rehabbed each producing \$5,000 net profit and would raise capital to nearly \$100,000. At this point 1 or 2 houses could be rehabbed with the group selling

houses could be rehabbed with the group selling them and carrying the finance themselves, while rehabbing 5 or 6 at a time and selling F.H.A. or V.A. to stay liquid. A knowleageable manager would be required but think of the benefits. An insurance agency could be established to handle the necessary coverage, black realtors would make commissions, black contractors would be plumbing, plaster, electrical, cement, painting, roofing and other contracts, thus hiring blacks. A holding company could be formed as well as a mortgage company, and later an escrow company, all of which would be able to him blacks. hire blacks.

As these houses are cleaned up your property values would rise, as witness the homes in North Las Vegas offered by Elliott Realty that sold for \$16,500 now have risen to \$17,000 and Mrs. Elliott says they will be going higher as the supply gets lower (law of supply and demand).

The mortgage company that could and would be formed would handle funds from financial

investors and eventually could grow into a savings and loan or a bank. Imperial Savings and Loan in Los Angeles was formed by this method.

Note that this all originated from \$40,000 as a beginning capital. This plan audios paying any interest on a loan (which usually cripples efforts) and would be generated within the black community, by the black community, for the black community and the financial gains would stay in the black community.

Interpol Lobby Effort Target of Request

Stating that the actions of a private, French based police cooperative operating in the U.S. and collecting data on California citizens is the business of the state, the Director for the National commission on Law Enforcement and Social Justice (NCLE) in Sacramento today filed a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request

with the U.S. Treasury Dept.

The request came after a refusal by John J. Featherstone, Deputy Assistant Secretary of of the Treasury to answer questions concerning the visit of Louis B. Sims, U.S. Chief of Interpol with members of the California Criminal Justice committee. The committee was considering a bill, AB 3888 by assemblyman Art Torres (D-La), to end California's cooperation with Interpol. The committee eventually placed the bill in interim study and passed a resolution to not only study Interpol, but all private police organizations operating in California.

NCLE officials claim that Interpol is a private, French police cooperative which is trying to be passed off as a federal agency. According to Michael O'Brien, Southwest director of the NCLE, "The complaint was filed with the Fair Political Practices commission because Interpol was not only being misrepresented, but be-cause the Treasury dept. was using texpayer funds to support the lobby actions of Sims." Earlier, the NCLE had filed a complaint with the FPPC charging misuse of federal funds for lobbying by the Treasury dept. Featherstone was ignored questions by the FPPC into the allegations.

Two Las Vegas churches, Muhammad's Mosque of Islam, and Zion Methodist church, directly requested their files from Interpol, citing the FOIA. According to Minister Amos Muham-man, of Muhammad's Mosque of Islam, "Without question, the federal government has infor-mation filed away on the Nation of Islam. We are concerned that, due to our international status, Interpol may have had the opportunity to obtain information on our religion. We intend to determine what information they have, and how much of that information is false or mislead-
