

Cortez to Run for **County Commission**

"The central issue in the County Commission race is the ability to govern with the full con-fidence of the people, backed by the competence to get the job done," said Manuel Cortez, Administrator of the Clark County Taxicab Authority, when he filed for the office of Clark County Commission, Seat B.

Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority. "With all these responsibilities, it is essential that all seven of the commissioners do their best to represent all the people, not just those with special interests " with special interests.

"I guarantee you, that will be the rule with Manuel Cortez as a County Commissioner." On Nonviolence

ATLANTA - An unprecedented gathering of the world's leading nonviolent strategists, thinkers, and activists met in Atlanta for an intensive eek-long Institute on Nonviolence and Social

The Institute, under the theme "Nonviolence in a Violent Society," included serious and de-tailed deliberations by activists in the human rights movement, scholars, public officials, ed-ucators, members of the clergy, jurists, law-yers, and other leaders who have demonstrated leadership and effectiveness in attacking and seeking remedy for social, political, education

and economic problems. The Institute included workshops, panel dis-cussions, films and tour of the King Center Com-plex in Atlanta. Working sessions of the confer-ence were held at the Interdenominational Theological Center at the University, where the King Center maintains temporary headquarters.

Topics addressed during the conference in-cluded a historical perspective on nonviolence and social change, the problem of crime, per-sonal and institutional violence, violence in education, media, the judicial system, political participation, nonviolent strategies for social reform in the 1970's, and nonviolence and the world

order. The Institute Awards Dinner at the end of the week was held at the Internationale Hotel and Dr. Martin Luther King, Sr., and Dr. Benjamin E. Mays were featured.

"I am willing to give that objective my full and best efforts, and I think I can do so by com-bining my background as an investigator, probation officer, and public defender into the office of Justice of the Peace. "I've been fortunate in my legal career to have

had the opportunity of gaining experience in many phases of the criminal justice system, and I think it's going to take that kind of experience to be an effective Justice of the Peace, and to give the extra effort necessary to help bring the Clark County crime problem under control."

He also said that there were many other important functions of the Justice of the Peace, including handling misdemeanor trials and con-ducting small claims court, and he would fully discuss all aspects of the office as the campaign progresses.

Bonaventure was awarded his Juris Doctor degree from the University of Arizona School of Law. He also received his BA degree from Arizona.

Bonaventure is married, and he and his wife Barbara live in Las Vegas. The Bonaventures have an infant son, Joseph Maximillian, who was born June 10.
