Blacks Should Boycott Ballot

Already economists are beginning to call the present national seven plus percent unemploy-ment rate as normal. This is twice as much as blacks can stand. While 7.5% is not effecting the white male worker, it is whipping the day-lights out of women, teenagers, blue collar and blacks. These are the people looking for jobs. The Presidential candidates are not paying attention to the needs of those not on the payroll. Carter is concerned about the consumer. Reagan is concerned about the corporation. Ford, well, we don't know what he is for.

Our problem is the priority of blacks and their businesses in this Presidential election year. The U.S. is losing manufacturing jobs in among others, the textiles, and electronics industries. These are the low skill required jobs which can

help absorb black unemployment.

The National Council on unemployment policy, reveals that the U.S. industries that gave birth to the job bloom after World War II is dying. The automobile, education, health and construction areas are past their pinnacle. There are no new industries being proposed by Presidential candidates to provide new jobs.

The old system of capitalism calls for constant corporate enterprise to cough up more and more jobs. Presently, only the poor part of capitalist program is being used to kill inflation. The cooling of the economy by cutting back on workers, while profits grow.

True, the number of workers has continued as expected to grow. The number of women workers has risen two and one-half times as fast as the female populartion since 1947. There are also other troubles.

OPEC has ordered a redistribution of wealth to its improverished people. Yet no Presidential candidate chooses to put forward a program for

full employment of the American people.
