From another vantage point, it has been interesting to note that European classical music has been greatly influenced by the music of Africa and Black America; and vice versa. It has almost been like a relay team where one school of thought borrowed heavily from the other. Naturally both schools embellished what they

borrowed with their own sense of feeling.

I have been writing my own interpretation muscially, and I intend to showcase it in the form
