

## Miriam Shearing on Judicial Process

Delays in the judicial process are a primary reason "for lack of respect for the law," Justice of the Peace candidate Miriam Shearing said recently.

Shearing said impersonal treatment of citizens in the lower courts also contributes to "bitterness and disrespect for our system of justice."

She said she will work to reduce court delays, including possible night court sessions for those working during the day.

With regard to impersonal treatment by the court, Shearing said, "far too often, people leave the court whether the subject is traffic, small claims, misdemeanors or felonies - with more bitterness against 'the law' than when they came in because of the way things are handled."

"I firmly believe that each case, regardless of the matter involved, must get full court attention. Every person has the right to come away from the court - regardless of the decision - knowing that they have had a full hearing by someone who cares," Shearing said.

Shearing, a practicing attorney for ten years, also serves as an alternate justice court referee.

## 57th FWW Vice Commander Retires

NELLIS AFB, Nev. -- Col. Fred J. Cuthill, 57th Fighter Weapons Wing vice commander, has announced his retirement from 25 years active duty. A special ceremony was held August 31 in front of the USAF Tactical Fighter



Weapons Center here. Colonel Cuthill was Commander of the 433rd Tactical Fighter Squadron at Ubon RTAFB, Thailand, flying the F-4 Phantom until July 1970. He then returned to Edwards AFB and served as the F-15 Test Director until Oct. 1971.

He was then pulled to the Pentagon and as Military Assistant to the Deputy Director, Test and Evaluation Office of the Secretary of Defense. Colonel Cuthill moved to Nellis in July 1974 and served as Deputy Chief of Staff for Test and Evaluation at the USAF Tactical Fighter Weapons Center until December 1975 when he assumed his present duties.

A command pilot, Colonel Cuthill has more than 5,700 flying hours, including 190 combat missions with 400 combat hours. His military decorations include the Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster; the Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters, Bronze Star Medal, Air Medal with 12 oak leaf clusters, and the Army and Air Force Commendation Medals.

## SNDAC Closes Central Intake Unit

Paul A. Montgomery, Executive Director of Southern Nevada Drug Abuse Council, announced today that, due to continued dwindling funds coming into Clark County for drug and alcohol abuse, a joint decision has been made between SNDAC and the State Bureau of Alcohol and Drug Abuse to close the recently opened Central Intake Unit on September 1.

Montgomery stated, "We believe that the termination of this program, now in its infancy stage, will have no serious or lasting effect on the treatment services in Southern Nevada. We also feel that the State Bureau of Alcohol and Drug Abuse's reallocation of these funds will be in the best interest of the entire drug treatment network, presently providing treatment in the Las Vegas area."

SNDAC will continue to seek additional funds for the treatment programs, and it is hoped that by July, 1977, new funds will be available to re-establish the Central Intake Unit.

## Family Planning Available to Low-Income

Family planning services are available to women with low-income through a program currently administered by the Economic Opportunity Board of Clark County.

Breast and pelvic examination, laboratory tests, pap smears, hematocrits, blood pressure tests and urinalysis in addition to contraceptive services are included in the family planning program.

Pregnancy verification, medication for vaginitis, sickle cell screening and counseling is also available.

The program is open to women up to the age of 44.

"People plan families for many reasons," says Esther Bell, Health Services Administrator. Delaying the first baby lets young people finish education, get established in a job, plan the kind of life they want."

Family planning is a very personal thing, meaning different things to different people.

"Spacing births protects the health of the mothers and babies," says Ms. Bell. "When one pregnancy is followed too closely by another, that baby is much more likely to be born prematurely. A large proportion of complications occurs in low weight babies."

More and more women are working outside the home to increase the family income because of today's cost of having and rearing children.

Simple economics is another reason for family planning according to Ms. Bell. "Limiting the size of a family also lets parents give more love and care to each child."

Family planning clinics are held on Mondays in Henderson at 750 Major Street from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., on Tuesdays in North Las Vegas at 2445 Las Vegas Blvd. No. from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. and in West Las Vegas at 940 West Owens on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. All Clinics are walk in, no appointment is necessary.

The program is funded by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. For more information call the EOB clinics at 648-3280, or 565-8443.
