

I can remember an Editorial written by the Review Journal in November 1975 commenting on Senator Neal's evaluation of the Westside as an ideal place for economic expansion. To have such knowledge of our own area was a shock to the white establishment.

Marches were held by Rev. Dunn and others to dramatize the question of economic develop-ment as a means of bringing jobs to this area. We all saw how certain folks stayed away from those demostrations and they tried to push the aims of the white establishment in this com-

aims of the white establishment in this con-munity. Mr. Bailey was among these individuals who tried to stall the aims and purpose of Albert Dunn. It was Mr. Bailey, Rev. Bennett and Lon-nie Chaney who were controlled and directed to fight and block the \$115,000 from coming to S.C.L.C. and this community. Well, on Tuesday of this week, the technical committee of the Regional Planning Council ap-proved the \$115,000 for planning. Guess who's out front saying what the black businessmen need -- Bob Bailey. It is an election year, Bob Bailey, and we have spotted you. You are not for the businessman,

spotted you. You are not for the businessman, or any other man. You are for yourself. Every since you have been in this community you have represented one person -- you! Mr. Bailey you have had every opportunity a black man could have in this community to be a successful businessman. But your grin has



The idea that big brother is watching you normally envisions huge cold gray IBM computers calculating your every move in 1984. But the real villain is AT&T (Ma Bell). Many people believe IBM is bigger than AT&T. It is not true. IBM is almost a dwarf next to the phone com-pany. Ma Bell has over 5 1/2 times the first

IBM is almost a dwarf next to the phone com-pany. Ma Bell has over 5-1/2 times the fixed assets (property) and about four times the em-ployees and twice the earnings of IBM. In fact, AT&T is not only larger than IBM, but larger than the combined totals of Honeywell, NCR (National Cash Register), Sperry Rand, Bur-roughs, Control Date, Xerox and all of the 37 domestic members of the computer Industry Association combined

Association combined! The bell bill, which AT&T and the other in-dependent telephone companies have drafted will put them firmly in the computer industry and could drown their color conscious competition. The problem for blacks and other poor people is that we might go down with the ship. The Bell bill would take away power from the Federal Communication Commission. Demean-

ing black FCC Commissioner Benjamin Hooks influence on behalf of blacks and other minorities

Although many industry associations are op-posed to the bill, they have difficulty matching the numbers and financial clout of the phone company. Ralph Nader is against the bill, but he needs his silent consumers' support.

he needs his silent consumers' support. The phone company hopes to put the author-ity to regulate their station equipment with the state rather than the FCC. Furthermore, Ma Bell wishes to reaffirm authority of states to regulate station equipment even if used for in-terstate service. Blacks know states' right means "racism" terstate service. means "racism."

The affirmative action program of AT&T and

its various phone company subsidiaries is a-trocious. On the other hand, IBM and Xerox have been models of moderate employment for blacks. Members of the Congressional Black Caucas Business in the Black (Continued on page 7.)
