Produced by KOCE-TV, Huntington Beach Calif. the documentary presents some Beach, Calif., the documentary presents some alarming statistics concerning Indians in Am-erican society: fifty percent of the Indian school children, twice the national average, fail to complete high school; infant morality among Indians is three times the national average; suicides among Indian teenagers is 100 times that of their white counterparts.

"My Father Calls Me Son: Racism and Na-tive Americans" is a visual attempt at helping the public understand the problems of racism and its effect on American Indians.
