The current congressional bill would force the 18 largest U.S. oil companies to operate in only one of the three major segments of the industry - production, pipelining or marketing.

When these companies are called on the carest blacks and apparents allowed will be able to

pet, blacks and consumers alike will be able to find out where the jobs positions and excess profits are in these complex companies. Once under control black business will have an equal opportunity to compete for vendor, banking, insurance and construction business of these money machines.

Blacks should write their congressmen urging the passing of the big oil break-u0 bill. It will get these culprits under our control.

morning - Judge William P. Compton ruled that the city must raise Lt. Bolden to tthe rank of

Captain.

Judge Compton ordered that the controversial findings of the Civil Service Commission be set aside. He further ordered that Bolden be paid such salary, retroactively to the time that he should have been properly certified and raised to Captain.

The City Attorney had used every legal manuver to block Bolden's certification and his announced goal of having Lt. Bolden removed

his announced goal of having Lt. Bolden removed from the department. Seeking postponements, one after another, plus a time consuming appeal to the State Supreme Court.

Judge Compton in making his decision stated that a significant part of the testimony received by the Board was clearly inadmissible opinion exidence. evidence, and should not have been admitted or considered, since none of the 10 persons present at the review session could or did testify that they SAW Bolden change any answers.

The Civil Service Board denial of Lt. Bolden being certified was an abuse of the Board's discretion.
