

Elections for Board of directors

Prospective candidates wishing to represent low-income residents on the Economic Op-portunity Board may file for election, in person, at the EOB Office, or by mail, from November 1st through 12th. Elections will be held on December 14th.

EOB Bylaws require that one-third of the members of the Board be democratically elected or selected representatives of residents of the areas and members of the groups to be served by programs of the Board.

One representative must be elected from each of the following geographic areas: Henderson, East Las Vegas, Moapa Valley, North Las Vegas, Sunrise-East Bonanza and Westside.

All persons, 18 years' of age and over, re-

siding in the designated area are eligible to file for a seat on the Board and to vote in the elec-tion deciding the geographic representative. The person receiving a plurality of votes cast in each geographic area will be declared the winner will take office at the January meeting of the Board.

Residents of the Henderson, East-Las Vegas area having the following zip codes are eligible to file for a seat on the Board and vote: 89015,

89112, 89120, 89121, and 89122.

In West Las Vegas, residents in an area bounded by Rancho Road, Bonanza Road, 25th Street and the northern city boundary line are eligible to participate as are residents of the Sunrise-East Bonanza area, bounded by Boulder High-way, Sunset Road, Pabco Road, Owens Avenue way, Sunset Ro and 25th Street.

Residents of North Las, Vegas and Moapa are

also eligible to participate.

The EOB is the Community Action Agency in Clark County whose purpose is to help solve and alleviate the problems of poverty.

va burial allowance available

Families of veterans should be made aware of the VA burial allowance available to former

servicemen and women, the VA said recently.
For example, VA provides a payment of up to \$250 toward the burial expenses of eligible veterans. An additional \$150 is available as a plot or interment allowance when burial is not in a National Cemetery or other cemetery under jurisdiction of the Federal government.

VA burial or plot allowances are not paid to the extent that payment has been made by the veteran's employer or by a State agency or


policical subdivision of a State.
When the veteran's death is service-connected, payment of an amount not to exceed \$800 will be made in lieu of the usual burial and interment allowances

With the exception of Arlington Natioal Cemetery, burial is available to eligible veterans at all National Cemeteries having space. Burial in these cemeteries may also be authorized for an eligible veteran's wife or husband, minor children and, under certain conditions, unmarried adult children.
