

A VISION One of our greatest present day leaders is Rev. Jesse Jackson, originiator of PUSH (People United to Save Humanity). Rev. Jackson has made tremendous strides in economic develop-ment in Chicago, his organization base. Writing in the Readers Digest of November, here are excerpts from his article in the New York Times Magazine. "The first task for Black Americans is to rise up from the decadence in which we too of-ten find outselves - and to do it with the force of our own will, our own energy, our own intel-

ten find outselves - and to do it with the lotce of our own will, our own energy, our own intel-lect. The need is urgent. The ethical collapse, the Heroin epidemic, the large numbers of our people who are out of work and on welfare and the disruptive violenece in our schools all in-dicate that the cities may be destroying us.

Black Americans must begin to accept a lar-ger share of responsibility for their lives. For too many years we have been crying that racism an oppression have kept us kown. It is time for us to stand up, admit to our failures and weaknesses, and begin to strengthen ourselves. There is a definite "welfare mentality" in our communities. We have become politically ana-There is a definite "welfare mentality" in our communities. We have become politically apa-thetic. Only seven million of our fourteen mil-lion eligible voters were registered to vote. We too often condem blacks who succeed and excel calling them Toms and the like, when the ideal ought to be for all of us to succeed and excel. Many leaders demand federal aid as the only solution. But money alone will not significan-tly change the welfare system, reduce crime, build enough new houses, improve education, restore stable families or eliminate drug abuse. A multitude of federal anti-proverty and urban renewal programs should have proved that by now.

We need to give the people a vision. We need to tell our young people we will get all the state-and federal money that we can; but first and foremost, we need to put your hands and your bodies and your minds to work building our communities. We must challenge our young peo-ple to put hope in their brains rather than dope in their veins. What difference does it make whether the doors swing open if our young people whether the doors swing open if our young people are too dizzy to walk through them. Black students became so caught up in Black

Power Symbolism that they forgot about such basic skills as reading, writing and thinking. Predominantly black schools are largely out of Predominantly black schools are largely out of control. Another crucial element in the situation is the church. The most stable influence in <sup>4</sup> Black communities. An estimated 14 to 15 mil-lion men, women and children are members of Black churches. High schools in Washington, Chicago and Los Angeles are working with the churches. Black ministers still carry moral au-thority with our people, and most people want moral authority. To this I add: Amen." From Our Readers

votes. I am very proud of the showing that we made


in this race. It only goes to show we will have to work harder next time and may I say to you, there will be another time...I have been in this community many years and I hope to be here many more. Thanks to all of you.






