



NAVY COMBAT ART EXHIBIT IN LAS VEGAS

A special showing of twenty-one original works of art from the Navy Department's Combat Art Exhibit will be on display February 21st thru the 24th from 8 AM to 10 PM and from 8 AM to 4 PM on the 25th at the UNLV Student Union Building, in honor of National Black History Month.

The paintings were selected specifically to show minority participation in the Navy as depicted by celebrated black artists.

entire Navy The Department Combat Art exhibit, or "Operation Palette", consists of over 4,000 action paintings and on-the-scene drawings made by artists on voluntary assignment with the Navy since the early days of World War Most of them are works of nationally known artists, and many paintings are individually famous, having been re-produced in national magazines and books. The entire Navy collection is considered a national treasure.
