A fourth grade instructor in the Washoe County School District has been named the 1977 Neva da Teacher of the Year by Superintendent of Public Instruction John R. Gamble.

Mrs. JoAnn Elston, who teaches at Reno's Echo Loder Elementary School, has taught for

17 years, 14 in her present position. "It's hard to say where my life took its turn towards being a teacher. I think probably it began when I was nine. It was my good fortune to be raised in the then small city of Carson. Not only did my parents raise me, but the town's people assisted in this rearing. The en-tire community was concerned with children's welfare and saw to it that all of us toed a pretty straight line." she said.

"My philosophy of teaching is simple," she went on. "I believe in treating each child as an individual and as I would want my own children treated. I feel the only way to do this is through a mixture of love sprinkled with firm and fair

discipline. "Since education is the root of our society, every attempt must be made to develop each child to his or her fullest potential.

"Most of all, I hope that as a teacher, I leave a mark imprinted on a child's life. Not a memory of myself, because that soon vanishes, but rather a mark that leaves the child with a deep love and desire for learning and reading, as well as the

skills with which to further this desire. "Thank goodness I am a teacher, because it is the most interesting and rewarding profession there is.

difficulty of the task, however, should not be an excuse for abandoning the effort or for pretend-ing that it is already on the way to solution. Nor should it be reason to back away from making the goal of jobs for all a fundamental commitment of national policy.

The administration's retreat from full employnent creates a number of dangers. Without full empolyment it will be impossible to achieve needed social reforms and improvements. But a greater danger is that complacency about unemployment will be contagious and frustrate other measures that are needed to improve the lives of the poor, minorities, and workers.

The Republican-inspired attempt to pass a permanent tax reduction, which has been defeated by the Senate, was a political gimmick not a serious proposal to create jobs. Under the guise of an effort to revive the economy, it would have foreclosed the possibility of enacting important reforms to which the administration is committed. It would have made it extremely difficult, if not impossible, to achieve a comprehensive tax reform later this year or next year. More importantly, it would have removed the revenue base that is needed for such log-over due programs as national

health insurance. Ther is still a need to stimulate the economy. The \$11 billion that was saved when President Carther abondaned the tax rebate should no be used just to cut the dificit; instead it should be used to directly put people to work. There is no way to get a balanced budget without full employ-ment. Employment in public waork programs can be substantially increased without creating any danger of inflation. Moreover, in addition to helping the general economy, these jobs can be aimed primarily at areas of high unemployment, where they will do the most good. Increased spending for public service and public works programs must now be supported by everyone who is com-mitted to reducing joblessness. Complacency about unemployment, in thought and

action, must end. Social justice cannot be achieved until there are jobs for all our workers. We have waited long enough for vigorous action to put America back to work.
