



HEAVY WEIGHT CHAMPIONS SALUTE SET FOR FRIDAY, MAY 20, 1977

An event of histroical proportions will take place in Las Vegas on Friday, May 20 when 'America Honors the Heavyweight Champoins' in the Aladdin Hotel Theatre of Performing Arts. Harry Bloomfield, Executive Coordinator, announcec that plans are now firmed for the uni-que event which will feature Muhammad Ali and most of the living former heavyweight boxing champoins. champoins.

champoins. In addition to Ali, those who have confirmed their participation include George Foreman, Joe Frazier, Floyd Patterson, Jersey Joe Walcott and Jack Sharkey. The legendary Joe Louis will be on hand, and the event will take on an inter-national flavor with the arrival of Max Schmeling, from Germany, and Ingemar Johannson, from Sweden. Circumstances may prevent Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney from attending, although every effort is being made to make this possible, said Bloomfiedl.


National Director of Publicity and Promotion for the Committee is Madison Square Garden's famed John F. X. Condon. Martin Black will be handling the local public relations. Superstars from the entertainment world will

act as presenters for each of the Champions who will receive a personalized gold and diamond ring symbolic of their achievement in the fistic world.

A magnificent poster relevant to the event was designed by Leroy Neiman and will set the motif for the staging of the event. The United Cerebral Palsy, Westchester, New York will benefit from the proceeds of the evening. Chico Vejar, is the Chairman of the Champions Committee of the United Cerebral Palsy, West-chester County, New York, which will benefit from the profits of the event. Vejar is noted for his campaigning mostly in the Middleweight Dovision during the 1950's when he appeared in 28 nationally televised matches fighting such men as Kid Gavilan and Tiger Jones. He retired in March of 1961 and he was undefeated in his last year as an active campaigner. In his last fight he defeated the Canadian Middleweight to retire because of the death of his first and only to retire because of the death of his first and only son, James Damion, who was a victim of Cerebral Palsy at the age of four. During the 16 years following Chico's retirement, he has worked almost exclusively with the United


