GOVERNOR SIGNS A.B. 735 A. B. 735 which provides money to local school districts on a per pupil basis, was signed Friday, May 6 by Governor Mike O'Callaghan while Superintendent John Gamble and Lincoln

Liston looked on. A. B. 735 will provide for basic support for schoold for 1977-79. The basic support formula for aid to education in Nevada is one of the most equitable of any state aid programs in the United States.

The formula was developed in 1967 through the efforts of a legislative committee headed by Senator Carl Dodge, with major contributions by Lincoln Liston of the Department of Education. The formula has been refined each biennium since its inception through efforts of Liston and district administrators and educators throughout the state.

Superintendent of Public Instruction, John Gam-e, in announcing the signing of the money bill ble. said, 'We are extremely fortunate to have the sup-port of the Governor and legislators. They have always attempted to provide the increased funds to meet the demands of the formula.'

A. B. 735 assures the schools of Nevada, and all the pupils who attend school, an equal ed-ucational opportunity.

Many people want to change because they what to discover unknown aspects of themselves or thier personalities, the study showed--like the housewife who decides to go back to school to get her college degree or the business executive who decides to take a leave of absence from work to travel. These people are changing their everyday pattern to add a new dimension to their lives.

According to the research, others look at change as a 'fresh start.' For example the woman who changes her hair style might feel that it gives her afresh, new look. And for many, there's a secret hope that change will make things better.

The study also showed that people continually seek new products to refl-ect their constantly changing attitudes toward life. Take soft drinks, for example. Since most Americans have become calorie conscious, the diet soft drinks are in great demand.

Decorating trends reflect changing attitudes. Fro example, the bathroom -that once 'forgotten' room of the house - has undergone a metamorphosis, the research revealed. Today, people are demanding more luxurious bathrooms with elegant accessories - like lights, plants, telephones, colorful plumbing and more attractive soap. Change, in many cases, is also con-

sidered as progress, the research indicated. Scientific and technological advancements have brought us smaller and more sophisticated calculators, pushbutton telephones, pocket cameras

and electric pencil sharpeners. Whatever the reason, people desire and expect change. And maybe they' are right. After all, as the saying goes, 'A change'll do you good!'
