Notice is hereby given that two public hearings will be held by the Regional Street and Highway Commission of Clark County in the City of North Las Vegas Council Chambers on July 14, 1977, for the purpose of considering two projects for which financial assistance is being soughtfrom the Urban Mass Transportation Administration, pursuant to the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended, generally described as follows:

8:30 am Purchase of five new 45-passenger, air-PDST conditioned diesel transit buses to be leased to Las Vegas Transit System, Inc.

8:45 am Operating assistance for the Economic PDST Opportunity Board's Elderly and Handicapped Transportation Program.
