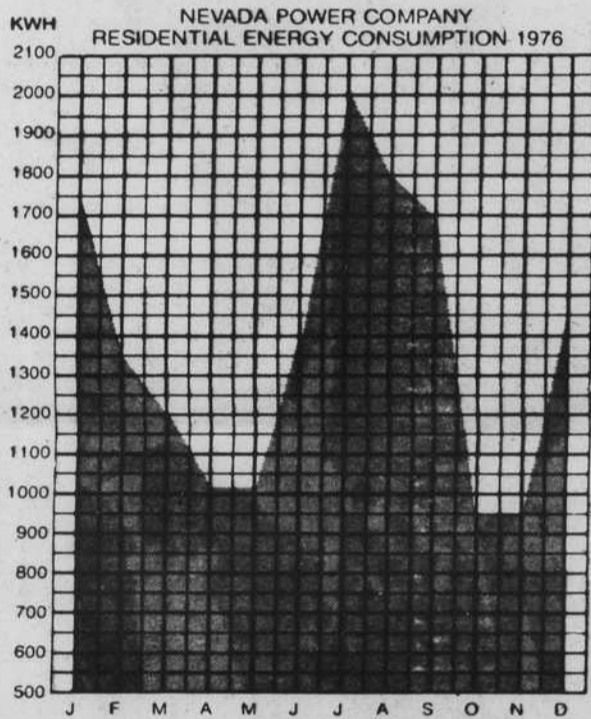


You are likely to use at least twice as much electricity in the summer months than you did in spring



This chart shows how much electricity the average Nevada Power Company residential customer used each month in 1976. You can see the great increase in the summer months, caused by air conditioning. It's not uncommon for air conditioning to double, triple or even quadruple power consumption in some homes. While your usage may not match these average monthly figures exactly, your overall pattern of power consumption should

Power usage and power bills in Las Vegas are always at their highest during the summer because of air conditioning. In many homes, electric consumption in these months is two or three times greater than it is in the springtime.

This summer, bills will be even higher for two additional reasons: First, a 10 percent rate increase became effective June 24. Second, residential rates were "flattened" last October. This means you are now paying the same for every kilowatt-hour used. (Formerly, rates declined with usage.)

The best way to hold your power bill down is to eliminate wasteful uses of electricity. There are many things you can do around your home to conserve. Family Planning

The Clark County Economic Opportunity Board's Health Services Department provides a Family Planning Program and a Cervical Cancer Screening Program to all low income persons of this area.

The Family Planning Program provides birth control counseling and all types of birth control methods. The patient receives a complete physical examination including weight, blood pressure, urinalysis, hematocrit, and par smear. Upon leaving the clinic the patient receives the type of birth control the physician feels is suitable for the particular individual.

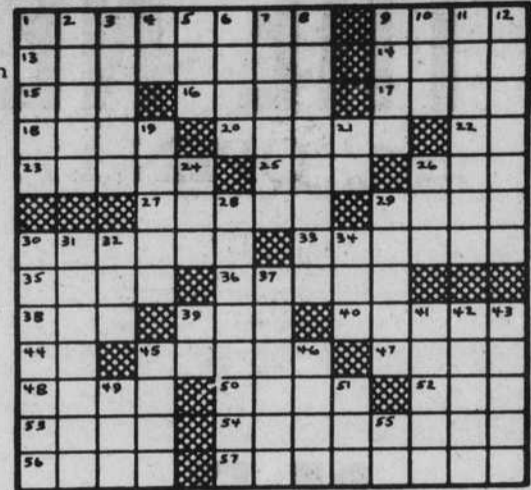
The Cervical Cancer Screening Program provides a breast examination and pap smear for all women of Clark County regardless of income free of charge.

New Editor

A 29-year-old graduate student in communication studies has been named the new editor of the weekly campus newspaper, The Yell, at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Colleen Newton was confirmed Tuesday by the Consolidated Student Senate as editor for the upcoming academic year.

She will be responsible for allocating the Yell's \$40,000 annual budget and supervising its staff of 20 student writers and editors.

Newton has served successively as writer, layout editor and managing editor of the newspaper for the past year and a half. During that time, the Yell earned its first awards from the Nevada State Press Association which cited the paper for its typography and spot news photography.

A 1971 history graduate of California State University, Long Beach, she served last fall as an intern in the newsroom of the Las Vegas SUN.

She has pledged to improve the quality of the newspaper by demanding better writing from her reporters and by initiating a 'beat' system of campus news gathering for the first time.

Newton's husband, Terry, is division manager for the United Parcel Service in Las Vegas.
