

BILLIE ROWE'S NOTEBOOK

N'YORK CITY --- After screening 1,000 police officers over the last 13 years a West Coast Psychiatrist said that 35% of all policemen now on duty are really "dangerous". This is the conclusion of Dr. Edward Shev, of picturesque Sausalito, across the Bay from San Francisco, who has authored the book "Good Cops, Bad Cops". Bar-Keepers Beware;--the Oregon Supreme Court shook-up the dispensers of Sin-Soup with a ruling that tavern owners can be held liable for the actions of patrons who get intoxicated on their premises. A lady name Betty Jane Pierce, who had an automobile accident while under the influence was the crux of the case. The family of two persons who were killed in the crash sued the owner of the tavern where Mrs. Pierce had been imbibing. They won and he had to cough up \$78,000 in damages . . . this looks like it will eventually end up in the U.S. Supreme Court.

Author Alan Paton, whose "Cry the Beloved Country", is known to millions because of its stage and screen exposure, vividly describes what it is like to live under "APARTHEID" in his native South Africa. "We have it to maintain our white identity. We want to preserve our power and our whiteness. We are afraid because we constitute only 17 per cent of the total population. Our basic motive is 'FEAR'. There are many white people in South Africa who will be angry with me for saying they are afraid. They are religious people and they want to believe that their laws are Christian. God made the races and therefore He wants them kept separate. He wants each race to achieve its own noble destiny. The laws may sometimes be cruel but the end is so noble that a little cruelty can be forgiven. In other words Apartheid and Christianity are almost the same thing. We suffer from a terrible blindness that will not let us see that Apartheid is not a grand and majestic racial plan".

A headline of a Sunday edition of the New York Times read, "Urban Poor Worst Off Than Ever, the demands of minority leaders have not changed--neither have tactics". If you think such lines are designed to further devastate the hopes and aspirations of our young, you're correct. The stories under such banners are usually by-lined by reporters, black or white, with little knowledge of the real struggle of people outside the main stream of Americanism. Part of what Juan Cruz, sales manager for Popular Ford in the Bushwick section of Brooklyn, said makes some sense. "It doesn't take much to get people here in the streets". Its been in the works for a long time, and the key is survival, it is not a matter of right or wrong. It will happen again because nobody is doing nothing about the problems.

child's safety

You don't have to be a doctor to help in the battle against the biggest killer andcrippler of pre-school age children, according to Dr. Albert H. Domm, child safety specialist and former medical director of Prudential Insurance Co. The killer Dr. Domm is talking about is not some dread disease but home accidents, which he defines as those which occur in the house, yard, or neighborhood.



Dr. Albert H. Domm And parental care and caution can go a long way in winning the war against need-less mishaps, he says. Dr. Domm strongly recommends that parents check each and every room of the house as well as neighborhood play areas for safety hazards.

"Poisonous household substances and medicines should be kept in locked cabinets," he said. "Sharp instruments which can seriously maim or kill must be kept out of the reach of the curious toddler."

Dr. Domm suggests fastening all windows securely and putting gates at the bottom and top of stairways to prevent injury from falls. Doors leading to outside balconies should be locked.

For yard safety, Dr. Domm urges parents to fence off a protected play area for children.

Dr. Domm also stresses the importance of parental responsibility for teaching good safety habits.
