Hobbled by numerous first-game mistakes. the 1977 UNLV football team was happy to just pull out a victory Saturday in Missoula against the University of Montana. Coach Tony Knap began his second season at UNLV by directing the Rebels to a come-from-behind, last-minute 15-13 victory over the rugged Grizzlies.


Junior Jim Gaetano booted a 28-yard field goal with 27 seconds left in the game to rpovide the slim margin of victory in the Rebels' season opener. Now, it's back to the drawing board for UNLV as the Rebels prepare to open their six-game home schedule with an 8:15 p.m. game on Saturday against Troy State University of Alabama.

Statistically looking at UNLV's first effort, it took 78 net yards in offense on the final

drive of the game to give the Rebels more total offense than Montana. For the game UNLV had 385 total yards (200 rushing and 185 passing) to 340 for Montana (224 rushing and 116 passing).

Uncharacteristic to a Tony Knap-coached team, the Rebels had fewer offensive plays than Montana, 73 for UNLV and 86 for Montana and a real startling stat was in time possession of the game. For the game, UNLV held onto the pigskin for only 26 minutes while the Grizzlies were able to keep it for 34 minutes. Using both senior Greg Van Ness and sophomore Carlton Kelley in the first half, the Behele and Grizzlies stood at 6-6 and
